(active citizenships and human rights):

children should develop as successful learners, confident individuals and responsible citizens who make a positive contribution to society.

The Citizenship curriculum is based on key concepts (democracy, justice, rights and responsibilities, identities and diversity) that children need to understand and key processes and skills (critical thinking and enquiry, advocacy and representation, taking informed and responsible action) they need to develop.

Our Curriculum for citizenship sets out teaching requirements that address a wide range of content including the legal system, the media, multiculturalism, equal opportunities, human rights, European and global education.

Teachers use topical political and social issues to bring citizenship content to life and to help pupils develop key citizenship skills of research, discussion and debate, as well as to represent the views of others, think critically, evaluate and reflect.

The Citizenship curriculum aims to develop student's ability to participate in communities and wider society as informed, critical and responsible citizens.

The purpose of "active citizenship" is to teach students to work together and take practical action, using their Citizenship knowledge and understanding to contribute to a better society.

For example, after learning about human rights, diversity and inequality, students might decide to set up a project to address racism in their school or local community.

Other examples of active Citizenship projects include starting recycling programmes, setting up student action groups to address bullying or promote fair trade.
